FAO officer helps give children brighter future

Non-profit initiative supports schoolchildren and communities

An FAO officer has described her motivation in setting up a non-profit initiative that is changing the lives of children and communities in Thailand.

'ChuayDek - Raising greener generations' supports schoolchildren from low-income families, who would otherwise struggle to receive an education.

It also helps those at potential risk of falling into drugs, prostitution or begging. Its work has been supported in the past year by donations from, among others, two FAO groups – the 1% for Development Fund and Fasting For Food.

Forestry officer Serena Fortuna said: "Throughout my life I've always wanted to support, in a somewhat more continuous, concrete and direct way, people in need. But I was never in the right place at the right time. I think my life in Thailand gave me that opportunity."

Fortuna visited Thailand for the first time in 2002, with an Italian NGO, and lived in Bangkok from 2007 working with the United Nations Environment Programme, the latter including collaborative work with FAO.

"The idea to start collecting funds began over a dinner one night," she explains. "We were in a nice restaurant, where between 10 people or so we spent approximately US\$300. It may not seem like a large amount of money, but with my close friend – who herself came from a local

area in Thailand – we realized that the amount we spent in one dinner could allow a young student to study for a couple of years, or to feed an entire school of 120 children for nearly a month. "From the initial idea of a 'one-off donation', we rapidly moved to that of getting active within our group of friends and providing more continuous support."

Fortuna and her friend Siriporn Sriaram then made further enquiries. A senior colleague told them about the Buddha Kasettra School, which aims to help children from hill tribes and others from the northern province of Mae Hong Sorn and surrounding provinces. Buddha Kasettra in Thai means the 'Buddhist way of agriculture'.

In addition to the normal curricula, the school teaches the children principles of organic agriculture and mutual respect.

The funding helped the school pay for children's meals and for education, among other things.

Fortuna left Thailand in late 2010, taking up her role with FAO, but the initiative in the country has only grown stronger.



A non-profit organization was created in 2012, enabling the volunteers to organize fundraising parties and events, access funds from governments, make donations tax-deductible, and to approach donors.

FAO officer Simone Borelli and clerks Elisa Miccinilli and Annamaria Ventresca were also founding members of ChuayDek, while several other FAO colleagues have since provided support through various means.

ChuayDek received one donation from FAO's 1% for Development Fund, whose members from FAO and WFP give 1% of their salaries each month to pay for small projects worldwide.

The donation paid for the farming of organic rice for the children – up to 50 tonnes depending on weather conditions – and for daily meals for around six months. A workshop also taught parents and local farmers about organic farming. Maria Grazia Bovo, a member of 1% fund who appraised the project prior to funding, said: "It was an excellent initiative and a nice mix between an agricultural and educational project. The 1% Fund strongly welcomes such initiatives."

On Wednesday (17 Oct) in Rome, ChuayDek received a donation from FAO's Fasting for Food group (pictured below with Fortuna and others receiving donations), during the latter's 14th anniversary. Since 1998, members of the group have skipped one meal each week, donating the money saved to small projects across Asia, Africa, Latin America and Western Europe.



The donation will help schoolchildren, some of their families and teachers to learn how to use the organic rice not only as food but also as a source of income. Livia Cellini, coordinator of Fasting for Food, said: "We chose ChuayDek because it reflects our main purpose – supporting small projects that make a difference and build a sustainable change."

ChuayDek also supports environmental awareness and education through first-hand experience. In February 2012, 30 schoolchildren left the mountains where they were born and swam for the first time in the ocean.

"I believe that when dedicating our time to ChuayDek, my friends and I can complement our work in FAO," added Fortuna.

"We learn from our work at FAO and we bring what we know directly to people who might benefit from this knowledge. Likewise we learn so much by working at grass-roots level, enriching and inspiring our work at FAO."
